

As a leading global partner, we work alongside government partners, supporters, stakeholders, families, and communities to transform lives and bring hope. Together, we have positively impacted the lives of **236,456 children in Viet Nam.**

STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES

CHILD PROTECTION & PARTICIPATION

In Viet Nam, World Vision's Child Protection & Participation programme reached **386,494 individuals - including 186,760 children**, of whom 128,002 were identified as in need of special protection - contributing to efforts under SDG 16 (Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions), and supporting SDG 5 (Gender Equality), SDG 10 (Reduced Inequalities), and SDG 1 (No Poverty).

With unwavering hope, we commit to addressing these challenges head-on. Through dedicated actions and collaboration with the government and our partners, we strive for every child a life in all its fullness.

Our efforts include:

- Empowering communities to recognise and combat child abuse and violence;
- Providing support and resources to child affected by trafficking and exploitation;
- Advocating for policies that protect children from labour and early marriage;
- Promoting safe online environments to prevent digital violence;
- Equipping children with life skills and living values to grow up safe, confident, and resilient.

HEALTH & NUTRITION

Our Health & Nutrition Programme contributes to the achievement of three Sustainable Development Goals: SDG 2 (Zero Hunger), SDG 3 (Good Health and Well-Being), and SDG 6 (Clean Water and Sanitation).

At the national level, we have successfully supported the National Institute of Nutrition in issuing technical guidelines for community-based nutrition interventions, including Nutrition Clubs and Timed & Targeted Counselling, under key National Target Programmes. We also trained all 63 provincial Centres for Disease Control to scale these models and contributed to the development of national guidelines on Nutrition in Emergencies, strengthening local health systems' preparedness and protecting child nutrition amid climate-related crises.

At the community level, we promote essential practices in nutrition, hygiene, and child care among parents and caregivers, especially those with malnourished children, through regular nutrition club meetings. We emphasize reproductive health care, improve water sources, sanitation, and hygiene practices to prevent diseases, and support children's thriving.

Viet Nam's National Nutrition Strategy aims to reduce child malnutrition to under 15% by 2025 and under 12% by 2030. To contribute to this national goal, in 2024, we, in collaboration with the National Institute of Nutrition, launched ENOUGH - a nutrition initiative with the vision of "A world where every child enjoys enough nourishing food so they can thrive."

The ENOUGH Initiative has engaged over 100 partners - including government agencies, community members, United Nations organisations, embassies, civil society organisations, corporations, and children themselves. The initiative has significantly raised public awareness on the importance of nutrition, while inspiring multi-sectoral collaboration.

At the provincial level, the Centres for Disease Control have actively supported the initiative by promoting its message and fostering collaboration with local departments and sectors.

From FY24 to FY26, the initiative is being implemented through a comprehensive annual action plan. Furthermore, we have successfully partnered with the Scaling Up Nutrition Civil Society Alliance (SUN CSA Network) to strengthen efforts in combating malnutrition nationwide.

At the global level, ENOUGH aims to impact 125 million children across 67 countries, contributing to a world where no child suffers from malnutrition.

WASH – WATER, SANITATION & HYGIENE

Our WASH interventions ensure access to safe and clean drinking water, handwashing facilities, latrines, sanitation and hygiene services in schools and communities. Through our WASH activities, we contributed to the reduction of diseases among children caused by unclean water and poor sanitation and hygiene - supporting SDG 6 (Clean Water and Sanitation), SDG 3 (Good Health and Wellbeing), and SDG 4 (Quality Education).

GENDER EQUALITY, DISABILITY& SOCIAL INCLUSION (GEDSI)

We strongly promote gender equality and social inclusion in all our programmes. Women and men, girls and boys, are being facilitated to raise their voices and to contribute to the processes of planning, implementing and evaluating development projects and programmes in their communities. This includes challenging patriarchal norms and ensuring equitable access to climate resources and benefits. GEDSI is not a standalone effort - it is a cross-cutting priority embedded across all our programs and projects, shaping how we design, implement, and evaluate our work - contributing to SDG 5 (Gender Equality), SDG 10 (Reduced Inequalities), SDG 13 (Climate Action), and SDG 16 (Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions).



FY24 HIGHLIGHTED ACTIONS

- Collaborate closely with ethnic minority communities
- Partner with organisations such as the Women's Union and Organisations of People with Disabilities, ensuring their active participation and informed consent in all climate and development initiatives

EMERGENCY RESPONSE& DISASTER RISK REDUCTION

Viet Nam is experiencing increasingly severe climate events, including Typhoon YAGI in September 2024 - the most powerful storm to hit the East Sea in 30 years and landfall in 70 years. It affected 3.6 million people across 26 provinces, damaged over 240,000 homes, and caused \$2 billion in losses.

In the face of such devastation, World Vision International in Viet Nam responded swiftly and compassionately. In close collaboration with government and humanitarian partners, the organisation delivered over 1 million USD in emergency aid, **reaching 33,845 people, including 11,682 children.** Beyond immediate relief, this response reinforced community resilience and strengthened preparedness for future climate-related disasters.

STORY FROM EMERGENCY RESPONSE

"When Typhoon Yagi struck, water rose rapidly in front of my house while a landslide destroyed the kitchen at the back," said Ms Hue from Yen Bai.

"My husband was away, and I was terrified as the water reached my neck. Thankfully, I managed to get our two young children to their grandparents' house."

In December, her family was among hundreds supported by aid from the European Civil Protection & Humanitarian Aid Operations (ECHO), through a consortium including World Vision, CARE, and Plan International. They received 3.5 million VND, hygiene supplies, and guidance to support their recovery. Ms Hue plans to use the funds to replace essential items for her children and clear debris from their home.

CLIMATE ACTION

World Vision International in Viet Nam recognises climate change as a critical challenge that disproportionately affects children, women, and vulnerable communities. We stand with vulnerable communities, committed to helping them build resilience and adapt to the realities of a changing climate, contributing to SDG 13 (Climate Action), SDG 1 (No Poverty), and SDG 11 (Sustainable Cities and Communities).

FY24 HIGHLIGHTED ACTIONS

- Solar-powered schools and rural lighting systems, improving safety, education, and reducing emissions
- Fuel-efficient cookstoves, which reduce deforestation and create a safer, cleaner cooking environment, particularly for women and girls
- Flood- and storm-resistant housing models, protecting families from natural disasters
- Digital tools for resilience building, including early warning systems, community-based risk mapping, and climate data platforms
- Watershed-based WASH (Water, Sanitation, Hygiene) integration and clean energy for household and livelihood use
- **Crop guardian** helps increase productivity, enhance resilience to natural disasters, and raise the market value of agricultural products. It also provides loans through solidarity groups with flexible terms tailored to the needs of poor households.



SPECIAL PROJECTS

Special Projects, spanning one to five years, are designed to address emerging or unconventional challenges in vulnerable communities - issues that can **have profound and lasting impacts on children's well-being**. In FY24, we implemented more than ten such projects, delivering targeted interventions to:

- Prevent child exploitation, including online sexual abuse and exploitation
- Address gender-based violence
- Support the reintegration of migrants into their communities
- Strengthen the resilience of ethnic minority communities to natural disasters and climate change through digital innovation and community-based disaster risk management
- Promote safe and inclusive learning environments for ethnic minority children
- Expand access to vocational training for disadvantaged youth

ORGANISATIONAL ACCOUNTABILITY

Safeguarding

In FY24, 46 child protection cases were reported and managed in line with the Safeguarding Incident Preparedness Plan. Confidential reporting channels, including a whistleblowing process, are actively promoted to staff, partners, and community members to ensure concerns are addressed while protecting reporters. Retaliation against good-faith reporters is strictly prohibited. Community feedback also plays a key role, with 517 submissions documented during this period, 97.3% of which received timely responses.

We are committed to safeguarding children and vulnerable adults. All staff and affiliates are accountable for upholding policies to ensure their safety and dignity.

Safeguarding policy is taught annually to all staff and partners who work with children. The organisation has a zero-tolerance policy toward violence, abuse, and exploitation, including sexual exploitation or abuse, by employees or affiliates.

People & Culture

We are committed to **creating a supportive and inclusive work environment.** Each year, all staff participate in the Our Voice Survey, which evaluates staff well-being and organisational health, including organisational culture, agility, leadership, and effectiveness. The previous year's results highlighted strengths in staff identity and risk management while indicating areas for improvement in Organisational Effectiveness.

Financial Transparency

We prioritise financial transparency and accountability, ensuring our resources are managed responsibly to achieve our mission. We adhere to ethical standards, undergo regular internal and external audits, and strive for cost-effective solutions to maximise impact.

We are committed to maintaining the trust and support of our donors, partners, and community, confirming our compliance with donor and statutory requirements and our commitment to transparency and integrity principles.
